Railroad Regulation

o Rests with the Federal Government. STB & FRA

Blocked Crossings

- A frequent and frustrating occurrence in ALL RR Towns!
- Cities and States currently have no power to limit how long trains can block.
- Several state and federal court rulings over the last 20 years have sided with the railroads that federal law preempts state and local law.
- There's a case headed to the U.S. Supreme Court out of Kansas on this right now. One of many attempts by State & local governments to regulate how long trains can block crossings.





Derailments

- 2019-2022: 1178/year Average (FRA)
- Hazmat Involvement:
 - "For every rail leak reported last year, there were 2 involving planes and 67 on highways."
 - 337 RR related HazMat spills in 2022. 32 classified as "serious". 6 caused injuries.
 - RR accidents accounted for 1 in 10 HazMat incidents over the last decade.

Fatalities

- FRA: 94% of RR fatalities and injuries occur at crossings or due to trespassing.
- FRA: Trespassing on RR ROW is the leading cause of rail-related deaths in the U.S. - more than 400/year.

HazMat

- CSX: "CSXT is a common carrier and as such is required by law to transport hazardous materials that have been properly prepared and offered for freight rail transportation in accordance with Federal Department of Transportation regulations."
- "There are certain ultra-hazardous materials such as toxic inhalation hazards that we would prefer no to handle. However, our common carrier requirement requires us to do so and we make every attempt to move these...with the highest levels of safety and security possible."





Incident Response

- Primary Local Response Agency: Fayette County Fire
 - Initial Priorities: life safety, incident stabilization, property preservation
 - HazMat Unit
- Fayette EMA: To provide coordination with outside agencies
- Law enforcement (Tyrone PD, FCSO, Etc.) scene security, crowd/traffic control, evacuation assistance, etc.





Incident Response

- Incident Investigation:
 - o FRA
 - NTSB
 - Other Federal Alphabet Agencies

Local Prep/Training

- The railroads and other related entities offer free training to local first responder agencies. TPD takes advantage of these offerings.
- Officers have a secure mobile app that allows them to enter information about an incident to get immediate input on train content, evacuation requirements, etc.





Information Session: Municipal Budgeting





- Local governments are required by law to adopt a balanced budget annually.
- Tyrone's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30
- The budgeting process usually begins with a planning workshop in February or March
- Finance begins looking at revenue projections in April of each year





- Once we have conservative estimates of revenue, we can begin to build the budget.
- Department heads are provided with spreadsheets that include their previous approved budget and actual expenses YTD. Usually in April.
- Department's budget requests are due late April for Admin review.





- The Mayor and Council will hold one or more public budget workshops to review the submitted proposals and provide feedback/guidance to staff.
- The budget proposal is revised based on Council's feedback and re-submitted for additional review.
- A required Public Hearing on the proposed budget is held in June - usually during the first Council meeting in June.
- The budget is officially adopted by Council by June 30 usually during the second Council meeting in June.





- Finance provides copies of the approved budget to elected officials and department heads.
- A digital copy is placed on the website for public access.
- The budget is submitted to the State.
- Audit season begins (August) covers the previous fiscal year's budget.
- Finance provides budget reports to Manager, Council, and Dept. Heads Monthly.

The Budgeting Process

- Current budget (July 1, 2022 June 30, 2023):
 - General Fund: \$11,462,684.77
 - Misc. Funds: \$8,298,018.61
- Primary Sources of Revenue (Top 5):
 - Sales Tax (LOST): \$1,900,000
 - Property Taxes: \$1,530,600
 - Insurance Premium Taxes: \$550,000
 - Electricity Franchise Taxes: \$330,000
 - Title Ad Valorem Taxes: \$220,000
